*Remember that the Haas Center is not the only place to get connected to service opportunities. Many of the following campus centers sponsor programs or have resources to help you find relevant service experiences.*

- ***American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian Program & Native American Cultural Center***

725-6944, Old Union Clubhouse, 1st floor

The Center provides a resource center and nurturing environment for Stanford's Native American community. It is the site of events, a headquarters for student organizations, publisher of Coming Voice and liaison between local and national Native American groups. Among its many service programs are Native American Public Service Tutoring, Stanford Powwow, and CLUE-IN Day (College Life and Undergraduate Education for Interested Natives).

- ***Asian American Activities Center***

The A<sup>3</sup>C is the hub of Stanford's Asian American community, acting as a resource center, a library, and a meeting place for groups. Various service organizations affiliated with the Center include the Listen to the Silence Conference, OASIS (Outreach to Asian Immigrant Students), Project PULL (People United through Learning and Leadership), Saathi, and many more.

- ***Bechtel International Center: Overseas Resource Center***

The ORC provides information and advising on going abroad on non-Stanford programs, overseas scholarships, and short-term work abroad. Information on major international awards (Fullbright, Rhodes, Marshall) and others is available organized according to geographic location. You can also look into funding for service projects and research overseas.

- ***Black Community Services Center***

The BCSC assists black students through education and cultural programs, leadership development and assistance in organization and community development. The BCSC serves as a resource and information referral center and is a liaison with Black communities outside of Stanford. Staffed with community service coordinators, the BCSC has a listing of all the Black Volunteer Service Organizations and activities including Holiday Benefit Parties & College Fairs.

- ***Career Development Center***

The CDC possesses an extensive collection of public service career information, offering workshops and panels, resources and directories, public service alumni & employer contacts, and a Shadow Program. It maintains regularly updated listings about public service fellowships, internships and employment opportunities, and holds a Public Service Career Fair. Make an appointment with the Public Service Career Counselor or check out the Public Service Employers Online Database - listings of national and international public service organizations and fellowships - and the Resource Library.

- ***El Centro Chicano***

El Centro, the Chicano/Latino student community and activities center, provides support and resources for student organizations engaging in cultural programming to heighten awareness and expression of Chicano culture and community. Service organizations affiliated with El Centro include among others: Barrio Assistance (Stanford's oldest community service organization), Ballet Folklórico, Project Motivation, Stanford Literacy Improvement Project, and Unidas.

- ***Vaden Health Center: Health Promotion Services***

Vaden offers academic courses, peer health education seminars, health information and referral, and outreach events designed to raise awareness and educate students about contemporary campus health issues. Training and volunteer opportunities are available in the areas of nutrition, CPR/First Aid, cold clinic, sexual health, the prevention and testing of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases, alcohol and drug abuse, and sexual assault and harassment prevention. You can also look into partnerships with health professionals and self-designed internships.

- ***Student Disability Resource Center***

The SDRC coordinates services and resources for students with documented disabilities, including mobility impairments, learning disabilities, chronic illness, psychological disabilities, and sensory disabilities. - ***Hillel Foundation***

The Hillel Foundation is the umbrella organization for all Jewish students, promoting a pluralist approach to educational, cultural, social, religious, and political events for the entire Stanford Jewish community. Hillel has a folder on community service opportunities and internships with a Jewish focus in their office and is also linked to many Jewish partner organizations that provide opportunities to study or do service in the area and abroad.

- ***Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Community Resource Center***

The LGBT-CRC is an information/referral resource, meeting center and “safe space” for members of Stanford’s Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Queer and Transgender communities. The center maintains a library, housing board, job listings, publications and information about LGBT-related activities and organizations along with a binder of service-related internships and job opportunities.

- ***Women’s Community Center***

The Women’s Center offers a health and general library, women’s programs, information on community events, support groups, and serves as a gathering place for many groups. The Center is connected to many service activities on campus through education, advocacy and direct service such as Herstory and Stanford United for Rape Elimination (SURE) Escort.

- ***Undergraduate Research Opportunities, Service-Learning & Academic Departments***

Many academic departments offer numerous opportunities for service-learning classes, social research projects and internships. Drop by a department office to talk with an advisor or head over to the UAC to talk with Laura Selznick about URO grants. Find out how you can obtain a faculty or academic department sponsor or receive a URO grant to start study-service connection projects (directed readings, individualized study, research positions, etc.). Departments with S/L classes or internships include: *American Studies, Anthropological Sciences, Cultural & Social Anthropology, Communications, Comparative Studies in Race & Ethnicity (CSRE), Earth Systems, Education, English, Feminist Studies, History, Human Biology, Industrial Engineering, Linguistics, Psychology, Public Policy, and Urban Studies.*
